

By the end of the year 1932 the Six Twenty Women's Club, for such was the name it had taken, numbered about forty members, and had held five meetings. The young women were brought together by a little publicity, individual leads, interviews with girls employed in Covington, and contacts with churches, schools, and other organizations.

As an educational, social, recreational and service club it ~~was~~ already ~~meeting~~ a definite and urgent need. During the spring of 1933 it did not grow rapidly in numbers, but the spirit of the group improved to such an extent that it made up one of the most eager and worthwhile parts of the Foundation. Dancing and dramatic groups met each week, under volunteer leadership; and outside the walls of the home, the girls did volunteer work at the Covington Day Nursery for several months.

The next fall, in October 1933 the club reached double its charter membership. Sixty girls attended the weekly meetings, coming from Covington, Latonia, Ludlow, Fort Mitchell, Newport, Dayton, Fort Thomas, and Pleasant Ridge.
