

TRINITY CHURCH (PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL)

The celebration of the anniversary of Trinity Church Sabbath School on Sunday afternoon last (May 7, 1854) was well attended. The exercises were appropriate and highly interesting. We learn that the school numbers about 100 scholars, and under the watchful care of Rev. Mr. Newton, pastor of the Church, is in a healthy and prosperous condition.

Covington Journal May 13, 1854

The concert of sacred music by the choir of Trinity Church Wednesday evening last (July 12, 1854) passed off to the entire satisfaction of those present. The audience though not large was discriminating.

The Rev. George D. Cummins, D D., has signified to the Standing Committee his acceptance of the high and responsible office of Assistant Bishop of the Diocese of Kentucky, to which he was elected by the Episcopal Convention last May.

Trinity Episcopal Church, Madison Street, purchased a new and magnificent organ for the church. It was built in New York City. The front is "gothic in design" The cost was \$4,000. Exhibition at the church Thursday Sept. 27, 1866. Full details of construction are given here.

1870. The first service was held in the new chapel of Trinity Church, in South Covington, on Sunday afternoon, Feb. 13, 1870. Bishop G D Cummins' unlooked for arrival added to the interfest, also his address, as were those of the rectors Rev. Mr. Greer and Rev. Mr. Kellogg.
